

## Club of the Year Mission Statement

### Equal

Proper representation of agendas and program promotion should be included in the scrapbook. Also, this club will promote a professional and positive image in relations with other clubs and organizations, on and off campus.

### High Morale

The Club of the Year should demonstrate eagerness between members to participate with great representation. This club should establish clear leader/member understanding and high expectations for other members, values, and conduct.

The contents of every scrapbook submitted should be the following:

- I. Two letters of recommendation
  - a. One campus sources
  - b. One unaffiliated source
  
- II. On-Campus Involvement (35%)
  - a. Participating in SGA required events (i.e. Club Day, SGA Leadership Retreat, weekly SGA meetings)
  - b. Participating in non-required SGA events (i.e. ABAC Fall Festival, Hay Bale Competition)
  - c. Organizing campus wide events (i.e. Coordinating and sponsoring Ms. ABAC)
  - d. Participating in campus wide events sponsored by other clubs (i.e. sending a representative for Mr. ABAC)
  
- III. Off-Campus Involvement (25%)
  - a. Applying your club purpose to activities in the community
  - b. Creativity and quality/originality of community outreach programs
  - c. General community service (i.e. trash pick-ups, singing at nursing homes)
  
- IV. Proper Programming (15%)
  - a. Quality of programming
  - b. Type of programming (i.e. Hunters Safety Course as compared to hunting events with the Racooners)
  - c. Academic Programming
  - d. Quantity/Participation level in response to programming
  
- V. Inner-club Involvement (20%)
  - a. Professionalism
  - b. High morale
  
- VI. Scrapbook (i.e. neatness, creativity, easy to read) (5%)
