From 2:45-4 p.m., Academic Affairs Vice President Niles Reddick will discuss his book on "Road Kill Art" or you can learn about the many ABAC trips coming up in a session titled "All Aboard." There will be a networking break between sessions.

All these sessions plus an introductory swing dance class will be held again on March 6 during the afternoon.

Following the last class sessions on March 5, a barbeque dinner will take place from 5:30-7 p.m. in the Donaldson Dining Hall. Diane Kilgore, Director of the PSBO, said the evening will include the cutting of a 70^{th} birthday cake.

Kilgore is one of only four directors of the continuing education program. Tom Cordell started the program in 1940 and established a nationwide reputation with 39 years of service. He was followed by Bob Keith and Jane

Tanner before Kilgore took the reins.

Carl Ray to Speak At ABAC Wednesday

Carl Ray, noted playwright and performer of the influential "A Killing in Choctaw", will be the featured guest in honor of Black History Month at 5 p.m. on Feb. 24 at the Chapel of All Faiths at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. The program is open to anyone who would like to attend at no charge.

Ray wrote "A Killing in Choctaw" based on his life growing up in Alabama and the tragic incident in 1962 that changed his life. Ray was beaten severely and his father was murdered in front of him because he did not say "sir" to a white man when questioned.

Shortly after his father's untimely and horrific death, Ray went to the Tuskegee Institute and received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering in 1967. He had a career in the aerospace industry but he was sidetracked early in his career by the need to perform as a stand-up comic.

He founded a youth opportunity program in East Palo Alto, Calif., in 1968 and began recruiting youth to attend historically black colleges and universities in 1970. He has chaperoned more than 4,000 students on bi-annual tours to these institutions. In 1988 he and his wife, Brenda, established the Courtland Esteem School, a private school in San Jose, Calif. For several years they educated young African American students from first to sixth grade.

Since 1999, Ray has been reliving the story of his father's murder in his play. Ray has performed the play more then 160 times at various venues throughout the United States. In 2004, it was made into a documentary. In 2006, a program that was based on Ray's story, "Why History Matters: The Choctaw Project", won a Silver Telly statuette, the highest award for cultural programming.

'An Evening for ABAC' Tickets Still Available

For the third year in a row, ABAC's student newspaper, "The Stallion", has been named the best two-year college

newspaper in Georgia. "The Stallion" received a total of 19 awards at the recent Georgia College **Press Association** (GCPA) Better Newspaper Conference.

In addition to winning first place for General Excellence in the two-year division, signifying the overall

best newspaper of the year, "The Stallion" placed among the top three winners in each of the contest's eight general award categories, including first place finishes for Best News, Layout and Design, and Improvement.

Current Managing Editor Jacob McWhorter also had the honor of being chosen as GCPA Vice President for 2010

Other general awards included second place for Editorial Excellence, Sports Excellence, General Advertising Excellence and Photography Excellence, and a third place finish for Best Features.

"The Stallion" also excelled in individual categories, claiming 10 awards. Steven Stubbs of Rochelle grabbed first place for Best Investigative Reporting News Article, and Felicia Lockey of Waycross won first place for Best Colıımn.

Second place awards went to Parker Ferren of Tallahassee, Fla., for Best Sports Photograph and Jacob McWhorter of Tifton for Best News Photograph and Best Entertainment Feature.

Third place awards were presented to Joseph Smith of Sylvester for Best News Objective Reporting News Article.

Ashlee Davis of Tifton for Best Column. McWhorter for **Best Feature** Story and Best Feature Photograph, and to Josh Griffin of Tifton for Best Sports Photograph.
