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Partlow Honored with Regents' Teaching Excellence Award

Melanie Partlow, assistant professor of mathematics and Quality Enhancement Plan Director at ABAC, received the 2011 Regents' Teaching Excellence award at the seventh annual Regents' Awards for Excellence in Education Celebration in Atlanta.

"While it is true that I strive to help each and every student achieve their goals, it never occurred to me that I might be recognized at the state level," Partlow said. "It is a humbling experience to be in a room with so many educators and supporters of education who are doing so much to make the world a better place for us all."

The awards program from the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia recognizes and rewards outstanding teaching by individual faculty members and outstanding teaching in a single academic program or department. The Teaching Excellence award

honors exemplary teaching that significantly improves student success.

Partlow has been a member of the ABAC faculty since 1998. She received her bachelor's degree in mathematics from Radford University and her master's degree in mathematics from the University of West Florida. She was selected as the recipient of the W. Bruce and Rosalyn Ray Donaldson Award for Teaching Excellence at ABAC in 2010.

Oriental Rug Exhibit Begins Thursday at Museum

The Gallery at the Georgia Museum of Agriculture and Historic Village operated by ABAC will host a new exhibit titled "One Thousand And One Nights: The Oriental Rug Collection of C.L. Morehead, Jr." beginning Thursday.

Gallery Coordinator Polly Huff from the ABAC Arts Connection said the new exhibit will showcase a selection of oriental silk, gold, silver, and cashmere rugs that are part of the never-before displayed rug collection of Morehead, an ABAC alumnus who lives in Athens.

The exhibit will be open to the public at the Museum Gallery from April 28 - July 28 from 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. on a Tuesday through Saturday basis. The ABAC Jazz Choir will perform at 12:30 p.m. on April 28 as part of the exhibit opening. Light refreshments will be provided at the event courtesy of the Tifton-Tift County Arts Council and the Hilton Garden Inn.

Morehead graduated from ABAC in 1948 and moved to Athens to study horticulture at the University of Georgia. In 1959, the Irwinville native opened a retail florist shop, later adding a whole-

sale florist operation. His friendship with Georgia artist Lamar Dodd developed Morehead's passion for collecting art.

Huff said the Morehead home is a stunning showcase of sculptures, oriental rugs, carvings, china, pre-Columbian art, and paintings, including the largest known collection of Dodd's work in the world, over 800 oil paintings and watercolors.

The rug collection on display at the Gallery will spotlight some very rare and exquisite rugs carefully acquired by Morehead over the last several decades. On display will be a sampling of the entire Morehead rug collection, which includes approximately 100 items.



The sampling features several camel hair carpets, wool rugs, Tabriz and Isfahan rugs, and several silk Hereke rugs. Each rug in the exhibit is an example of the finest mastery of hand-knotted carpet-making.

Also on display will be an oil rendition of the Hagia Sophia Mosque in Istanbul, a painting by Dodd. The painting is a special preview of an upcoming Gallery exhibit featuring the Morehead collection of Dodd works.

This exhibit is hosted in partnership with the Tifton-Tift County Arts Council and is a featured event of the Love Affair Fine Arts Festival. The Love Affair will kick off activities on April 29 in downtown Tifton, and entertain patrons with a great selection of visual and performing arts on April 30 - May 1 at Fulwood Park.



Cruise the Danube River with ABAC December 1-9

The Office of External Affairs at ABAC will offer a fantastic trip to Europe on Dec. 1-9, including a six-night cruise on the Danube River. Travelers who book the trip by May 1 can save \$400 per couple.

Travelers will depart from Atlanta on an overnight flight and land in Vienna, Austria to board the cruise ship. A tour of Austria's capital city of Vienna will include Hofburg Palace, the Vienna Opera House, St. Stephens Cathedral, and the city's most famous Christmas Market. An optional trip to Schoenbrunn Palace, the summer retreat of the Habsburg dynasty, will also be offered.

Tourists will also cruise through the Wachau Valley and dock at Emmersdorf to travel the town or take an optional excursion to see the 900-year old Benedictine Melk Abbey in Durnstein. The group will then take in Passau, a 2000-year old city rich in its ornate baroque architecture, before returning to the ship to enjoy on-board entertainment and dinner.

Travelers will later experience Regensburg with its preserved medieval cities and colorful Christmas Markets. In the evening, the passengers will feast at the Captain's Gala Dinner aboard the ship while departing for Nuremburg.

Once passengers cross the continental divide in Roth, the ship will dock in Nuremburg for a tour to see the Imperial Castle and the Justice Palace, where the War Crimes Tribunal sat in 1946. Passengers will then leave the cruise ship to spend a day in Rothenburg and take a tour of Wurzburg.

The package price for this trip is \$2,979 per person (double occupancy). The trip includes 19 meals, round trip airfare, and hotel transfers.
