ABAC Fall Choral Concert Tuesday at 7 p.m.

A wide variety of choral music will be featured on the program when the Concert Choir at ABAC performs in its fall concert at 7 p.m. on Tuesday in Howard Auditorium on the ABAC campus. The concert is open to the public at no charge.

Dr. Susan Roe, professor of voice, directs the 86-member choir. She said the group includes students from all over the southeastern part of the United States. Marjorie Fix is the piano accompanist for the group.

The choir's selections for the evening will begin with "The Star Spangled Banner" arranged by John Stafford Smith,

followed by "Gloria in Excelsis De" by Jay Althouse. The next piece, "Heart We Will Forget Him" by Victor C. Johnson, will be sung by the sopranos and altos accompanied by Fix and Betsy Sone Jones on the

cello. The tenors and basses will then present "The Awakening" by Joseph M.

The ABAC Jazz Choir will perform two Cole Porter pieces, "You'd Be So Nice To Come Home To" and "You're The Top", followed by the ABAC Chamber Singers who will perform "There Is Faint Music" by Dan Forrest and "Prayer of The Children" by Andrea S. Klouse.

An American spiritual, "On My Way To Jordan", arranged by Jay Althouse, the traditional spiritual "I've Been in the Storm So Long", arranged by Mark Hayes, and "Battle Hymn of the Republic" by Peter M. Wilhousky will be sung by the entire Concert Choir to conclude the evening's performance.

Baldwin Players Perform "Rabbit Hole" Starting Thursday

"Rabbit Hole", the Baldwin Players' upcoming fall production at ABAC, will take place Thursday-Saturday at 7:30 p.m. on the third floor of Conger Hall, Room 319. Tickets for the production are free to faculty, staff, and students with ABAC ID. The general public can purchase tickets at the door for \$5.

"Rabbit Hole" is a play that deals with the variety of ways family members cope with loss, grief, and healing. Written by David Lindsay-Abaire, "Rabbit Hole" was the recipient of the 2007 Pulitzer Prize for Drama and was nominated for four Tony Awards in 2006, garnering Cynthia Nixon the Tony in the Best Actress - Play category. It received its first full production in New York in 2006, and it has also been produced by regional theatres in cities such as Los Angeles, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

The cast for "Rabbit Hole" include Laura Cerone, a pre-nursing major from Bainbridge; Kaitlin Croft, a student at Tift County High School; Mauricio Soto, a medicine major from Wray; Michelle North, an early childhood education major from Tifton; and Cory Rogers, an engineering major from Enigma. Noelle Stuart, an agribusiness and agricultural communication major from Coolidge, is assistant director/stage manager for the production.

The play contains strong language and adult situations. It is not recommended for children.

Liebegott Hopes to Break Guinness Record Wed.

On Wednesday, ABAC hopes to set a new record that will put the college on the map once more by breaking the Guinness Book of World Records for playing the largest game of hide and seek. The idea came from ABAC's Director of Student Activities, Kris Liebegott.

"This is something that I have always wanted to do," said Liebegott. "When I accepted the position here, I ran it by some of the students and they were really receptive to the idea of attempting the largest game of hide and seek. The idea just brainstormed into fruition."

The current record is 245 people held by a Queen of Angels Catholic School in Roswell. The game at ABAC will be played on 12.7 acres for an hour.

Those who would like to help make history can sign up at 8 p.m. in the center of The Meadows on the campus of ABAC and the game will begin at 9 p.m. All ABAC students, faculty, and staff are welcome to participate. People under 18 years of age must have parental consent.

The students will practice with members of the ABAC Jazz Choir and Chamber Singers for a concert to be presented that afternoon at 4 p.m. at Howard Auditorium on the ABAC campus. Sponsored by the Student Activities Committee at ABAC, the concert is free and open to the public.

ABAC Choral Program Director Susan Roe said this year's guest clinician is Dr. Larry Wyatt from the University of South Carolina. Wyatt will work with all the students throughout the day leading up to the performance. Wyatt is the director of the Concert Choir, as well as supervising the master's and doctoral
