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Commerce Student Wins Top Award at ABAC Commencement

Sara C. Ervin, a Rural Studies major from Commerce, received the prestigious George P. Donaldson award at the ABAC fall commencement ceremony on Friday.

Ervin completed all requirements for her Associate of Science degree in Agriculture, while she continues her education for an ABAC bachelor's degree in Rural Studies.

A total of 136 graduates participated in the ceremony. Fourteen students received Bachelor of Applied Science degrees in Diversified Agriculture and Turfgrass and Golf Course Management, the most in the history of the college.

Commencement speaker Javier Gonzalez told the graduates that "on your career journeys you may find it necessary to change directions several times. Like any journey, you will need to carefully create a good map to help you chart the course that will carry you effectively and efficiently toward your defined goal," Gonzalez said.

Gonzalez, Director of the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) and the High School Equivalency (HEP) program at ABAC, said he grew up in a family of nine children. His parents were migrant farm workers, and he had to drop out of high school to help his family financially. He later received his GED en route to a bachelor's degree and a master's degree.

"My journey from an undereducated farm worker to a commencement speaker has not been an easy one," Gonzalez said. "I challenge you to use your diploma as a springboard to success. You must be prepared to meet the

challenges and remove the obstacles that could stand in your way." Ervin, President Pro Tempore and a senator in the Student Government Association, was selected for the Donaldson Award based on a combination of academics and extra-curricular activities. The award included a plaque and a check for \$500 from the ABAC Alumni Association. Donaldson served as

president of ABAC from 1947-61.

The daughter of James and Sandra Ervin of Commerce, Ervin was the co-founder and President of the Rural Studies Club. She is a past state FFA Vice-President and served as the President of the ABAC collegiate FFA chapter in 2008. She will serve as the first ABAC/Staplcotn intern on Capitol Hill with United States Senator Saxby Chambliss during the spring semester.

Chancellor Says ABAC Has Developed 'Statewide Brand'

University System of Georgia Chancellor Erroll B. Davis, Jr., says ABAC has a "statewide brand" that sets it apart from other state colleges in the System.

"Unlike most of the other access sector colleges in the System, ABAC has a unique statewide brand," Davis, who visited the ABAC campus on Dec. 7, said. "ABAC graduates have gone out and done well in a variety of different fields."

ABAC attracts over 3,300 students from 152 of Georgia's 159 counties, 17 other

states, and 11 countries. Over 1,100 students live on campus. Davis visited with ABAC student leaders as well as faculty members, administrators, and community leaders during his day-long visit.

"I try to get out of Atlanta at least three times a month for the specific purpose of visiting the campuses in the System," Davis said.

Davis said he expects the number of students in the System to continue to climb.

"In spite of diminishing resources, we have had explosive growth," Davis said.

"The University System is an investment for this state. Educated people provide value to the State of Georgia. Through our colleges and universities, we are providing for the future of this state."

Davis predicts an additional 100,000 students in the System by 2020. He hopes many of them enter the System through institutions such as ABAC.

"We want students to go to the access sector of the System," Davis said. "That's why we have to make an institution such as ABAC as attractive as possible to students."

Davis said the System can educate a student for approximately one-third of the cost at an access institution in comparison to the University of Georgia.

"The access sector is the fastest growing sector as far as the number of credit hours," Davis said.

"Brock felt that Doug was due thanks for his service in Guam, as well as for the continual help he gives to those in the service," said Perry. "He also wanted to thank Doug for helping him adjust to being home again."

"Brock is the kind of individual who we want representing ABAC and will be just as great of a representative in his civilian life," said Waid.

Ward has also served in Bosnia, Kosovo, and Iraq during his military career. He is a resident of Adel majoring in diversified agriculture.

ABAC Faculty Member Receives Award From SEAFWA

Dr. William Moore, assistant professor of wildlife technology at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, was recently honored with an award for Best Wildlife Paper Presentation by the Southeastern Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (SEAFWA).

Moore presented his research dissertation for his Ph. D. on wild turkeys at the annual convention held in Corpus Christi, TX in October, 2008. All awards from the previous conference are awarded the following year. This was Moore's first time presenting for the SEAFWA.

"I had no idea that I had received the award," Moore said. "When the plaque came in the mail, I was trying to figure out what might be in the box. I was shocked and surprised to see that it was an award from SEAFWA."

The Southeastern Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies is made up of federal and state agencies, along with the Wildlife Society, the international professional organization devoted to wildlife conservation and education.

"I have been more active with the Wildlife Society and have presented at the National Wildlife Society conferences in Arizona in 2007 and in California in 2009," Moore said.

The Wildlife Society is a national organization that is divided by region and is part of the SEAFWA conference.

Moore's educational background includes an Associate of Science degree from ABAC; his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Forest Resources from the University of Georgia; and his Ph.D. in Forest Resources from Clemson University. He is also the current president of the Georgia Chapter of The Wildlife Society.
