Gonzalez Speaking at Commencement Friday

Javier Gonzalez, Director of the College Assistance Migrant Program and the High School Equivalency Program at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, will be the featured speaker at the ABAC fall commencement ceremony at 6 p.m. on Friday in Gressette Gym.

"I feel extremely honored to have the opportunity to address the graduating class," Gonzalez said. "Having come from a humble background, where earning a college degree was a very rare exception, I learned the value of education at very early age."

Gonzalez has been a member of the ABAC staff since 2003. In recent weeks, he has been selected to attend the University System of Georgia Executive Leadership Institute. The institute addresses the need for succession planning by identifying and developing high potential employees to equip them to become the next generation of exemplary leaders.

He has been involved in the education field for 18 years. He served as a Resource Specialist for the Marion County Board of Education and an Adolescent Outreach Specialist at the Chatahoochee-Flint Regional Education

Service Agency (RESA) before joining the ABAC staff.

Gonzalez earned a General Educational Development (GED) diploma from Heart of Georgia Technical College. He received his bachelor's degree in Spanish from Georgia Southern University and a Master's in Education Leadership degree from Columbus State University. He earned an English as a Second Language (ESL)

certification from the State University of West Georgia and an education certification in Spanish Education K-12 from Georgia Southwestern State University.

"I came to understand that education is the great equalizer, that a diploma at any level, from a GED to a Ph.D, can provide the same opportunities for success to anyone regardless of their background," Gonzalez said.

"It is my hope that my words will inspire the graduates to utilize their earned diploma to confidently face the next phase of their educational or personal journey and take pride in their accomplishment."

A total of 133 students are expected to participate in the ceremony.

Regents Approve Fee Increase for USG Students

An increase of \$50 has been added to the students' institutional fee at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College beginning with the spring semester of 2010. The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia (USG) approved a mandatory increase for all USG students. This fee will be added to the current ABAC mandatory fee of \$50, which went into effect in January, 2009.

Although the \$50 increase for ABAC and other two-year/state colleges will be an additional burden on students, it is not as severe as the \$100 increase per semester at the research universities, as well as at Georgia Southern University, Valdosta State University, Georgia College and State University, Kennesaw State University, Southern Polytechnic State University, and the University of West Georgia. Other comprehensive universities will have a \$75 increase.

"Funds derived from this fee will go directly to offset budget cuts that the state has or will have as far as funding goes," John Clemens, ABAC Vice President for Fiscal Affairs, said.

ABAC students who have already paid their fees for the spring semester will receive an e-bill through their e-mail to reflect the additional \$50 charge. Banner accounts for ABAC students will reflect the \$50 charge at that time.

The HOPE scholarship will not cover this fee, but other financial aid (Pell, loans) will cover the fee if a student's award amount is sufficient. For students who have pre-registered, all charges for spring semester 2010 must be paid by Dec. 14, 2009, at 4:30 p.m.

The Board of Regents is also adjusting the System's budget from a six percent reduction to an eight percent reduction level for the current fiscal year. The special institutional fee is part of the overall strategy to ensure access and academic excellence for students. The fee increase spreads the cost equitably among all USG students.
