Robert Gerhart has been named Chief Information Officer at ABAC, according to an announcement by ABAC President David Bridges.

"I am excited about the experience and innovative ideas Robert will bring to ABAC," Bridges said. "His outgoing personality and drive to get the job done will result in needed advancements to campus technology."

Gerhart comes to ABAC from the Georgia Institute of Technology where he has served as the Special Projects Director in the office of the CIO since 2012. Prior to this position he served as Director of Information Technology in the College of Architecture at Georgia Tech since 1999. From 2009 until 2012 he assumed the additional responsibilities

of managing facilities for the College of Architecture. During his 15 year tenure at Georgia Tech, Gerhart has been responsible for identifying and fulfilling all technology needs that support education, instruction, research and business operations.

He has seen and adapted to rapid technological changes while at Georgia Tech and is excited to do the same at ABAC.

"It is inspiring to see what students accomplish when they combine their creative imagination with a little technical knowledge. I feel fortunate to be able to contribute to that process. I see



my role as the Chief Information Officer (CIO) at ABAC as an enabler," Gerhart said. "My goal as CIO will be to assist students along with the faculty and staff that support them with the technical tools and resources they need to succeed not only while they are at ABAC, but also in preparation for their chosen careers."

Gerhart received a B.A. in Sociology from Lee University in Cleveland, Tenn. and earned his Master of Science degree in Building Construction and Integrated Facilities Management from Georgia Institute of Technology in 2009.

ABAC's Phi Theta Kappa Named Five-Star Chapter

The Omega Delta Chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society at ABAC was recently named a Five Star Chapter at the PTK regional conference in Douglas. The honor completes one of the organization's multi-year goals. Being named a Five Star Chapter is the most exclusive status a chapter can achieve.

The Five Star Chapter Plan recognizes chapters for student engagement, both on campus and in the community. As part of its Five Star efforts, Omega Delta was awarded the 2013 Distinguished Issue Award for its Honors in Action Project: Food Fight. Demonstrating excellence in academic



research and leadership, the student-led project encompassed a range of activities including a hunger awareness dinner, food waste in the community, and food collection for local pantries.

The Omega Delta Chapter hosts

many activities on the ABAC campus including Trick or Treat for Kids, "Welcome Back" events for the faculty, and its newest event, the crowning of the ABAC Homecoming King and Queen in 2014.

To be eligible for Phi Theta Kappa membership, ABAC students must have at least a 3.5 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and must have completed 12 semester hours. Members are eligible for over \$87 million in scholarship opportunities from Phi Theta Kappa, partnering with senior colleges, universities and foundations.

Along with scholarships, many lead-

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ership and academic awards are available to PTK members. At ABAC, two students competed for The All-USA Community College Academic Team, which recognizes high achieving two-year college students who demonstrate academic excellence and intellectual rigor combined with leadership and service that extends education beyond

the classroom. Receiving the recognition for 2014 were Jessica Gorseth, a criminal justice major from Ball Ground, and Jessica VanDeVelde, a Rural Studies - Social and Community Development major from Omega.

Kappa Sigma Presents 'My Brother's Keeper' Thursday in Meadows


The Rho-Rho Chapter of Kappa Sigma fraternity at ABAC will partner with ABAC, the Governor's Office of Highway Safety, and the Tifton and Tift County Public Safety Departments to combat alcohol abuse, including underage drinking and impaired driving, with a program titled "My Brother's Keeper" on April 22 at 11 a.m. in The Meadows on the campus of ABAC.

Through the Highway Safety office, ABAC received a \$6,000 grant to sponsor programs designed for college and university students in the state. The group focuses on peer education in order to promote and bring awareness to highway safety issues including alcohol education, alcohol abuse prevention, impaired driving, underage drinking, safety belts, speeding, risk reductions and other destructive decisions.

"My Brother's Keeper" is a program that will help raise awareness of the

many dangers that students face while driving under the influence. Open from 11 a.m. - 2 p.m., the event features demonstrations and scenarios of irresponsible driving. The mission of this event is to educate students on the dangers of driving under the influence, texting while driving, not wearing a seatbelt, and other safety issues behind the wheel. Students will learn that it's the simple decisions while operating a motor vehicle that can save their lives, lives of family members, and the lives of others around them.

The long-term goal of the program is to create safer, healthier campus environments. ABAC will use this Peer Education grant to help educate the students on the detriments of drinking and driving and other components of alcohol misuse. The grant began Oct. 1, 2013 and runs through Sept. 30, 2014.
