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Evans Named Dean of School of Arts and Sciences

Taking a leadership role in the academic structure at ABAC is nothing new for Dr. Johnny Evans. That's why he was well suited to assume the position of Dean of the newly created School of Arts and Sciences at ABAC on July 1.

Evans, Dean of the School of Science and Mathematics since 2013, looks forward to the new structure which also includes three other schools of study, the School of Agriculture and Natural Resources, the School of Nursing and Health Sciences, and the Stafford School of Business.

"Because we offer the core curriculum within our school, we serve as the foundation of academic success for all ABAC students," Evans said. "Core curriculum develops critical thinking skills, writing and creativity. And since all the core curriculum is now under

one umbrella we can streamline and improve core classes more easily."

The School of Arts and Sciences will now house the departments of English and Communication, Fine Arts, History and Political Science, Science and Mathematics, and Rural Sociology.

"With the consolidation into one school we needed an experienced Dean to lead and guide the programs," said Dr. Jerry Baker, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs. "This consolidation will also merge the faculty and the cultures that have allowed the previous



programs to be successful."

ABAC President David Bridges announced last year that the previous six schools of study would be consolidated into four. Dr. Darby Sewell is now the Acting Dean of the School of Agriculture and Natural Resources since Baker left that position to become the Provost and Vice

President of Academic Affairs upon the retirement of Dr. Gail Dillard.

"Students won't really feel the effect of the restructuring because all the department heads and faculty will be the same, as will the classes," Evans said. "We are simply combining the administration. I have a great team of department heads who will do a wonderful job for the School."

ABAC Faculty Members Promoted; Six Granted Tenure

Seven members of the faculty at ABAC have been approved for promotion, according to Dr. Jerry Baker, ABAC Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs. Six faculty members have also been granted tenure at the college.

Those faculty members receiving promotions include Donna Campbell, Dr. Heather Cathcart, Dr. Kingsley Dunkley, Dr. Thomas Grant, Dr. Jan Gregus, Dr. Chris Kiser, and Dr. Hans Schmeisser.

Cathcart, Grant, Gregus, Kiser, Robin Crumley, and Shawn Seat received tenure from ABAC. Tenure may be granted to a faculty member who has served at least five years as an assistant professor and has shown the potential for making significant contributions to the college and in the faculty member's field of study.

A member of the ABAC faculty since 1995, **Campbell** has been promoted from assistant professor to associate professor of health in the School of Nursing and Health Sciences. She earned her associate degree from Middle Georgia College, and her bachelor's and master's degrees in health and physical education from Georgia College and State University.

Cathcart earned her bachelor's degree in biology from Armstrong Atlantic State University; her master's in biology from Georgia Southern University; and her Ph.D. in cellular biology and anatomy from Georgia Health Sciences University. An ABAC faculty member since 2012, she has been promoted from assistant

professor to associate professor in the School of Arts and Sciences.

Dunkley earned his bachelor's degree in agriculture and master's degree in animal science from Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical University and his Ph. D. in poultry science from Texas A&M University. He has been promoted to the rank of professor from associate professor of biology in the School of Arts and Sciences. Dunkley has been a part of the ABAC faculty since 2008.

Grant received his bachelor's degree in English from Washington State University and his master's degree in journalism from Columbia University. He then received his Ph.D. in journalism from the University of Utah. Grant joined the ABAC faculty in 2012. He has been promoted from assistant professor to

Dobbs Named Assistant Baseball Coach at ABAC

Aaron Dobbs is the new assistant baseball coach at ABAC, according to an announcement today by ABAC Coach Brandon Reeder.

“It’s good to have a coach of Aaron’s caliber come on board to help us continue to build momentum with our baseball program,” Reeder said.

“He has some great relationships with coaches around the Southeast that will really benefit us from a recruiting standpoint.”

Dobbs will serve as the Golden Stallions’ hitting coach and work with the infielders. He joins the ABAC staff after a four-year stint coaching travel baseball with 5 Star



National in Warner Robins. In his tenure with 5 Star National, formerly known as Chain Baseball, Dobbs coached nearly 100 players who went on to sign with NCAA Division I schools and nine Major League Baseball draft picks.

“I’m ready to get started,” Dobbs said. “Everyone that I’ve met

so far at ABAC has been very nice and welcoming. This place has everything to offer. I’m excited to be a Stallion and eager to work toward the goal of winning a conference championship.”

Dobbs finished his collegiate baseball playing career with two seasons at Division I Kennesaw

State University after playing two years at Gordon State College. He earned First Team All-Atlantic Sun Conference in both seasons at KSU, his junior season as an outfielder, and his senior season as a third baseman. Dobbs was also named to the Atlantic Sun All-Tournament Team after leading the Owls to the A-Sun title game.

Dobbs set the Gordon State single season record for games played, walks, and triples during his sophomore season. He finished his career at Gordon with a .338 batting average and led the team in stolen bases with 49 in 2010.

“I’ve known Aaron for a long time,” Reeder said. “He brings a lot to the table by way of knowledge, experience, and enthusiasm. Our players will benefit greatly from having him around every day.”

RHA Begins Professional Clothing Closet and Food Pantry for ABAC Students

Over the last year, the Residence Life and Housing department has been working diligently to firmly establish the ABAC Residence Hall Association (RHA). RHA is a national, student-run organization that serves to represent residential students and functions on a model that is similar to a standard, university-level Student Government Association.

The RHA executive board has established a firm foundation upon which to build their organization and, as such, are now implementing two running programs.

tour, and time at the pool.

On Aug. 14, students can take tours of the Thrash Wellness Center, the Academic Achievement Center and their class route. Four different sessions on "How to Thrive, Not Just Survive" focusing on budget planning, stress management, technology, and information on the ABAC Health Center will be available. From 1:30-3 p.m., five more sessions will be available including Finish in Four: Mastering Your Academic Schedule, Where to Go: Services Available on Campus, Library Resources, Social Media Beware, and additional technology sessions. From 3-6 p.m. students can take advantage of the pool and Wellness Center. The evening presentation is titled "College Success Lessons from the Dance Floor" in Gressette Gym at 7:30 p.m.

On Aug. 15, School Connections sessions are geared to the various academic programs

and will focus on setting academic expectations and engaged learning opportunities. Freshman Convocation featuring ABAC alumna Louise Hill is at 11 a.m. in Gressette Gym.

Presidential Scholar Jamie

Worsley will give the freshman response. After lunch, students can attend sessions on staying healthy, time management, tools for critical thinking in college and beyond, health professions, and agricultural education.

Students will join the Deans and Department Heads for ice cream on the ABAC Lakeside lawn from 3:30-4 p.m., followed by fun on the water slides and a movie on the Lakeside Lawn. One of the highlights of the "Weeks of Welcome" is the premiere of the documentary, "Elephants in the Coffee," on Aug. 30 at 6 p.m. in Howard Auditorium. The one-hour documentary produced by Associate Professor of Journalism Thomas Grant and his students, shows how the expansion of coffee plantations in Southern India led to conflicts between humans and elephants.

Fall semester classes extend through Dec. 6. The fall commencement ceremony is scheduled for Dec. 14.
